
A black dog appears outside the Hope family's home


This striking picture book is a retelling of the story of Noah and the ark.


Mr Wolf is about to dig up the enormous turnip in his garden for stew when a frog demands his assistance: the kiss of a princess is needed to restore his prince-hood.


The little mermaid falls in love with a human prince and is given a potion by the sea witch to turn her mermaid's tail to legs so she can walk on the land.






Subtitled 'a children's story in five nights' this powerful, moving and beautifully-written fable from poet Ted Hughes is a true modern classic.




Using just the word 'previously' various fairytales are retold – starting with their endings and working back to their beginnings.










An updated and somewhat sanitised retelling of the classic fairy tale in which Red Riding Hood learns a valuable lesson about not talking to strangers.




This contemporary retelling of how Princess Sita is kidnapped by the Demon King and ultimately rescued by her true love, Rama, exudes excitement and exoticism.
