


Posy is a whiskers wiper and a crayon swiper, a playful wrangler and knitting tangler, but she is also an adorable, playful kitten.

## Princess Grace




Oliver Tibbs has been rechristened 'Oliver Fibbs' by classmates because of his habit of telling whoppers in an attempt to appear more impressive.




Monkey has just got to go to Volcano Valley to hear the Tale of Tales, the greatest story of all.


It's a long way to Bethlehem, so Joseph and Mary leave their cat and dog with a kind neighbour - but the animals are lonely and run away to find them.


An account of the secret work carried out during WWII at Bletchley Park, based on the experience of Manning's own mother, Taff.






Colin the busy independent cat lives wild. But with no soft cushion to snuggle down on he misses having a home of his own at snooze-time.



by Annie Kubler


A captivating story of wolves with dinner on their minds. The wolf finger puppet attached to the book brings the story to life and is great fun for snapping at little fingers.

by Laurence Anholt


This book centres on the teenage Monique, who comes to nurse Matisse, already an old man but living in rooms filled with his amazing colourful art.

by Ronda Armitage



by Dianne Hofmeyr


Each beautiful jewel-coloured illustration evokes magical stories and the poetic text is perfect for parents to read aloud. An extraordinary true story.

by Alison Murray



by Julia Donaldson


Postman Bear writes three letters and goes out to deliver them in Acorn Wood. By lifting the flaps young readers can find out who they are for.

by Anthony Browne


Another book about Willy the chimpanzee who doesn't conform to the macho stereotypes and so comes in for a lot of hard times and bullying.

by Abie Longstaff



by Elys Dolan


Fans of Elys Dolan's first book, *Weasels*, will love this second offering: a fun intergalactic caper packed with similarly silly humour.


There was a time when Monkeys didn't swing in the trees. They used to stay on the ground and play.

by Anne Fine




Five years after the publication of multi award-winning *The Gruffalo*, author Julia Donaldson and illustrator Axel Scheffler return with a much-awaited sequel.

by Jeanne Willis



by Nicholas Allan


A giant is caught short when his loo roll drops to the floor and rolls away. As it rolls through the town the people make use of the enormous sheets to devise all sorts of useful creations.

by Bill Martin Jr and Eric Carle


An all-time favourite that introduces different colours through simple text, presented in a satisfyingly repetitive pattern.

by Anthony Lewis


This board book has popular rhymes and songs with young children signing key words. It also features a child with an arm splint and a child with a hearing aid.

by Anushka Ravishankar


A highly original picture book from India, this is the story of a tiger who ventures onto human territory.

by Nicola Smees


This board book for the youngest readers has bright, funny bold drawings and a simple text exploring a considerable variety of feelings, all eventually happily resolved.

by Hiawyn Oram


Emily loves everything about Christmas... except for Santa Claus. She simply can't bear the thought of him coming into their house on Christmas Eve.

by Terry Deary


Have you ever staked your own sister in a bet? Well that's what happens to Ellie when her brother Cypselis has a dare with Big Bacchad at school.

by Cressida Cowell


Lying in bed, Emily can hear lots of household noises which she discovers are made by a Thing who is afraid of things.

by Jeanne Willis


Manky Monkey is sad because he doesn't feel comfortable doing what the other monkeys do but he's not sure why.


Wibbly Pig and Pigley have just left a party and Wibbly's desperate to discover what's inside the mysterious parcel in his party bag.




Award-winning writer and director Richard Curtis turns his hand to picture books in this magical festive story, beautifully illustrated by Rebecca Cobb

by John Burningham


A mother tells her little boy that 'there's going to be a baby', but the little boy doesn't like the sound of this – he doesn't think they really need the new baby...


Little Bo Peep has lost her sheep – but she's hoping a library book will provide hints on finding them.

by Mark Sperring


There was once a brave little knight who lived in land filled with fierce dragons. One day, his mother handed him a sunflower – for why ever would he want a sword?

by Tove Jansson


In this book, first published in 1960, we meet Toffle, a vulnerable, lonely and sad creature who cannot get over his terrible complexes and worries.
