


24 poets from around the English-speaking world provide a commentary on their work, their methods and sources of inspiration - a fascinating and immensely useful project.

by Dr Seuss


Click on the objects on every page to find the word. With the sound of rain falling you feel as though you're fully immersed in the book.

by Giles Andreae


This is just the book to explain to inquisitive children what going on inside mum during pregnancy.

by Rachael Mortimer



by Giles Andreae


When a book begins: 'Red pants, green pants, Yellow Submarine pants, Dancing with the Queen pants, la la la!' you know you're in safe hands!

by Nick Sharratt



by Hilary Robinson


Jake finds what he thinks is proof of a crocodile in his local pond. He tells a man in a van, and the man sends his dog to take a look...

by TS Eliot



by Tony Mitton



by Annie Kubler


Part of the Sign and Singalong series of bright, colourful books featuring children showing signs and actions to accompany simple rhymes.

by Annie Kubler


This book is all about signing and singing-along! The clear hand movements encourage signing as well as dancing.

by Julia Donaldson and Axel Scheffler


The ever-popular Gruffalo returns in musical form in this book of songs to sing and play from Julia Donaldson.

by Sarah Garson


Here is a rhyming, counting book with cockatoos having fun on every page.

by Ellie Sandall


Delicate representations of meadow and tree, and quirky, colourful birds amusingly illustrate a gentle fable.

by Nicky Benson



by Emma Dodd


A large, bright, creepy-crawly bug safari through a little boy's garden, with a final spread which shows how we often react to them.

by Julia Donaldson & Lydia Monks


Julia Donaldson and Lydia Monks have teamed up to create another delightful picture book, complete with sparkly glitter on each page.




A delightful new collection of nineteen poems, ranging from limerick to parody, from the author of the classic *Please Mrs Butler*.

by Julia Donaldson and Lydia Monks


Princess Eliza is having a birthday party. But just as she blows out the seven candles on her cake, the wicked wizard arrives... uninvited.


The classics take their place in this collection, but are interspersed with less familiar poems by writers from Ted Hughes to Langston Hughes to Harindranath Chattopadhyaya.



## One Night in the Zoo




At the end of Edward Lear's much loved poem, the happily married Owl and the Pussy-cat are dancing hand-in-hand on the edge of the sand... but what happened next?


Jarman's richly comical poem of Class Two's encounter with an anaconda is reminiscent of Belloc's *Cautionary Tales*.




Tiny Little Fly zips between the elephant's nose and the tiger's claw, outwitting all of the other animals in this beautifully-designed picture book.

by Annie Kubler


On every page of this board book are attractive, colourful illustrations of babies clapping their hands, rolling about on the floor and hugging their friends.

by Clement C. Moore



by Smriti Prasad-Halls


This is a reassuring picture book for the very youngest – ideal for bedtime, with its simple, undemanding and child-friendly backgrounds.

by Julia Donaldson and Nick Sharratt


In this vibrant counting book, one mole digging a hole is soon joined by a troupe of gardening friends, including nine doves in gardening gloves and ten bees pruning trees.

by Lynley Dodd


This hilarious rhyming story follows Hairy Maclary from Donaldson's Dairy, as he sets off for a walk in town
