


Tove Jansson's original picture book from 1952 has been transformed into a beautiful interactive story in this iPad app.


Kipper has a new camera and starts the year as he means to go on, by taking photographs during each month so he doesn't forget what he and his best friend Tiger got up to.


A delightfully improbable ending crowns this story of friendship lost and regained which is fabulously illustrated in vivid colour with Eric Carle's distinctive collage technique.








Sartorial action hero, Traction Man, returns! He and Scrubbing Brush dauntlessly scale the compost heap, cross the swampy pond then return, exhausted.

by Petr Horacek


Quietly comical and beautifully illustrated, this is a delightfully scary but reassuring variation on a 'list' book which warns young readers of the dangers of straying from home.




Vivid, exciting and imaginative illustrations complement a charming story celebrating difference, friendship, non-verbal communication and alternative views of the world.


This fabulous, wordless picture book contains two stories. One that runs from start to finish and the other that runs from finish to start.




In this metafictional tale, a pencil discovers its creative powers, at first tentatively drawing a boy, then more confidently providing him with what he asks for; a dog, then a cat.


Grace has always dreamed of being a princess and when there's a competition to select a princess for a school parade, it creates wild excitement...


Wendel is a very clever mouse and a brilliant inventor. He is also incredibly untidy and simply throws his inventions away if they don't work.




